

NEW BOARD MEMBER

MEET Wayne Moffatt - for the past 20 years one of Australia's most progressive bowls administrators - and now the newest addition to the World Bowls Board of Directors.

The recently retired chief executive of Queensland's magnificent Club Pine Rivers, Wayne drove the introduction of televised international competitions at the Brisbane venue, hosting test matches between Australia, Ireland, Wales, England and South Africa.

More recently Pine Rivers was the inaugural host club of the popular Bowls Premier League TV series, which continues to this day.

Formal qualifications in business and business administration along with the passion for bowls developed as a respected competitor make Wayne a valuable asset to the World Bowls Board of Directors.

He replaces international star and world champion Karen Murphy from Australia, who has retired after a distinguished term as Regional Director for Asia and Oceania since August 2014.

At the recent elections John McArdle from South Africa was reappointed as Regional Director for Africa and The Americas, while Garry Collins from Guernsey was reappointed as Regional Director for Europe (including British Isles).

These appointments will be ratified at the April 14 World Bowls Council meeting.

Supporting the game across the world

Staying true to our motto 'Supporting the game across the world', many more positive steps have been taken in our unstinting determination to grow the sport of lawn bowls globally in the time since we last dispensed a newsletter from World Bowls headquarters.

As has been mentioned previously, the development of bowls comes in so many different forms, individual and collective, management and leadership, starting out, improving the status quo, nurturing opportunities and mentoring talent, etc. It is all encompassing.

WE have welcomed fledgling nations Iran and Jamaica to the World Bowls family and wish them every success as they build the sport in their respective parts of the world.

ANOTHER positive development comes in the form of negotiations with the World Indoor Bowls Council (WIBC), with a view to affiliate to World Bowls under a revised name with the membership of WIBC having 'approved a draft agreement in its entirety'. A final decision will be ratified next month.

THE Board was thrilled to declare that China and Hong Kong have been granted hosting rights to the 2023 Asia Pacific Championships and 2024 World Bowls Championships respectively.

LIKEWISE, it was recently announced by Bowls England that the Victoria Park complex at Royal Leamington Spa, will be the host venue of the 2022 Commonwealth Games bowls competition.

OUR congratulations are extended to Bowling Federation of India president Sunaina Kumari, who has been elected as a vice president of the Indian Olympic Committee.

HEART warming moment recently in Hong Kong when officials of World Bowls were assessing candidate umpires for elevation to International Technical Official (ITO) status. One of the applicants was an umpire from Japan, Hirokazu Mori, who passed the assessment to become an ITO and is the first one in Japan to have sat the test. Congratulations.

EXCITEMENT continues to build in the South Pacific area where Regional Director Karen Murphy has frontlined the steering committee of Bowls Fiji president Radhika Prasad as secretary, recently retired Bowls NZ chief executive Kerry Clark, Norfolk Island's Phil Jones and Chris Wallace from Bowls Australia, in the formation of Bowls Oceania.

This is a massive boon for the smaller island countries on so many levels and promises a fantastic future in the region.
